Because in the Upper Valley, Approximately 1 in 7 Adults and Children Face Food Insecurity



Overview

The Upper Valley Haven's Community Food Market offers reliable, choice-based grocery access, including fresh produce, dairy, meat, non-perishables, and personal care items to anyone who needs it, regardless of income.

How it Works

- Monthly full grocery orders (multi-family visits allowed)
- Daily walk-in food access for essentials like bread, produce, and prepared meals
- Community outreach partnerships, including Dartmouth Health's Moms in Recovery, LISTEN's Community Dinners, Turning Point, local churches, and more

- Open Monday–Thursday, 10:00 AM 4:30 PM; Friday 10:00 AM – 3:00 PM
- Curbside pickup & in-person shopping options
- Welcomes individuals across Vermont and New Hampshire

Because Everyone Deserves Safety, Support, and a Place to Begin Again






Byrne Family Shelter

The Byrne House Family Shelter offers a safe, temporary home for families experiencing homelessness. During their stay, parents work one-on-one with Service Coordinators to pursue goals related to housing, employment, education, child development, and stability.



Children in the shelter are welcomed into the Haven's After-School and Summer Programs, providing joyful, enriching experiences while parents focus on next steps. Families enjoy the privacy of their own unit, along with shared spaces that encourage support, connection, and a sense of belonging.



Hixon Adult Shelter

Hixon House serves adults and couples without minor children who are experiencing homelessness. Guests have access to a stable, safe environment where they receive three daily meals, case management, and support to pursue personal goals — including housing, employment, and health care.



The shelter includes communal spaces and shared resources that foster dignity and connection. Many guests use Hixon as a springboard toward lasting independence and self-sufficiency.









Community Service Coordination

Overview

Haven Service Coordinators offer personalized, relationship-driven support to individuals and families navigating poverty, housing instability, or other crises. From housing applications to budgeting and referrals, our team guides people through real steps toward stability—with dignity and care at the center.

What We Do

- Assess individual/family needs and identify strengths
- Design service plans tailored to each person's goals
- Support guests in securing housing, childcare, transportation, and employment
- Offer budgeting help, housing counseling, and resource navigation
- Build trusted relationships with landlords and employers
- Collaborate with local agencies to provide coordinated care
- Provide transportation via bus passes or rides, when needed

Overview

The Haven's Children's Program offers afterschool care during the school year and fullday summer programming for children who currently live or have lived in our shelters. In a safe, structured environment, kids build confidence, develop life skills, and experience joy through hands-on learning and enrichment.

These consistent experiences help children regain a sense of normalcy, build trusting relationships, and imagine new possibilities for their future. At the same time, parents have space to focus on stability and next steps.


